Norm was the founding member of Hawkes Bay Naturist Club in 1962; those of you who have visited the club will



know the grounds are known as "Rapere". You may not know this was in his honour: Ra = Sun, Pere = Bell. This recognised his generosity in purchasing the property and later, once the membership was large enough to enable a mortgage to be raised, selling it at no extra cost, to the club.

Although Norman was not one to socialise much he certainly was a worker behind the scenes especially in the development and maintenance of Norm's Lodge, repainting the pool many times and dozens of other projects at Rapere.

The club owes him a huge debt as our founder and mainstay over the whole sixty years of the club's existence.

Hiking the Billygoat Track

It was already starting to rain as we rendezvoused at Rhodes Park, Thames, just before 10 a.m. However, that was never going to put the damper on our eagerness to hit the Billygoat trail, deep in the Kauaeranga Forest, on the Coromandel Peninsula.

Of several track possibilities available, this was to be the best option, given the wet conditions and river level resulting from the last few days of rain. Instead of having to cross the river through the water, the Billygoat track is accessible via a new suspension bridge built by Abseil Access in December 2020. Also, the track is almost all gravel or stone surfaced, or hewn out of the solid rock on the steeper sections, so there was next to no mud with which to contend.

The forecast for the morning was for thunderstorms and heavy rain, but the worst we encountered was a consistent light drizzle, up until around 12:30 p.m. with a couple of periods of moderate rainfall. In fact, with the day temperature reaching 23 degrees, the misty rain made for a most pleasant and comfortable walk. Clothes certainly have their place in extremes of cold, but the human body is designed to cope better without clothes than with them in the temperate maritime climate of the Coromandel Range. While doing energetic activities such as this, it's easier for the body to regulate its temperature without extra layers of textile trapping in the heat.

Seven of us – Shane, Alan, Philippe, Stephen, Charles, Dawei and I, Rok - piled into two vehicles and drove the 30 minutes to the car park at end of the Kauaeranga Valley Road, where the track begins. After stripping off and sorting out what gear to take, we headed for the cleaning station at the start of the track. The Kauaeranga Forest is home to what is left of the once-abundant Kauri tree. Human traffic is the main

way Kauri dieback disease is spread, so cleaning footwear and gear is the best way to contain the disease and save what is left of these magnificent forest giants.

With a girth commonly exceeding 10 metres and a height to the crown approaching 50 metres, the Kauri was once king of the Kauaeranga Valley forest. After the discovery of goldbearing quartz reefs near Thames in 1867, gold mining on the Coromandel started in earnest. Within a year the population of Thames had climbed to 18,000 and large companies were taking control of the goldfields, investing huge sums of money to develop the infrastructure for ore processing. Logging of Kauaeranga's Kauri happened mainly in response to the demand for timber to fuel the goldrush and an insatiable demand for quality timber to construct houses, shops, hotels and supports for the structures in the mining tunnels and shafts. By the time logging ceased in 1928 the once magnificent Kauri forests had been all but annihilated.

The first part of the Billygoat track follows the Western bank of the Kauaeranga for about half a kilometre before crossing at the new suspension bridge, We then follow the river for a further 11/2 Km before passing turning Eastwards up Webb Creek, named after Sam Webb, who was given the contract to log Kauri from the Billygoat Stream area in the 1880s. After bearing right at the junction with the Moss Creek Track, the track starts to climb, and the surface is now river rock - a little uneven but still well maintained. A few meters further up and Alan was provided with his heart's desire - a small waterfall cascading into a tiny rivulet.

Eventually we came to the remains of a log jam, just before the first Webb Creek swing bridge. Once across the bridge, the track is formed by steps cut into the solid rock as it makes its steep ascent towards the Hydro Camp, crossing the creek once again via a singleperson swing bridge. We passed a family coming down that I'd encountered the day before during my recce of the track. One of the

The family had stayed the night at the Pinnacles Hut and the parents were proud of the kids managing to complete this rather challenging school-holiday excursion, making it right to the Pinnacles Lookout at the summit.

That was not going to be within the time constraints of our hike, however, and at the top of the first ridge we decided it was time to start the return, stopping for lunch at the log jam we'd passed earlier. The rain had stopped and the sun was starting to poke out of blue patches of sky. It was a welcome break, feeling the warmth on the skin and listening to the sound of the water rushing over the rocks. After a few photos it was back to the track for the less arduous portion of the trail back to the car park, via the Billygoat Falls lookout.

With 45 minutes still up our sleeves, we decided to end the day with a dip at Hoffman's Pool - a popular swimming hole at the spot where the old logging tramline crossed the Kauaeranga River. In fact, the concrete foundations of the trestle bridge are still there today.

So how did our trampers feel about the walk? Here are some of their thoughts . . .

- "It was an enjoyable first experience hiking naked in the bush with a group of fellow Naturists." Steve
- "When I came across a young mum and daughter at the spot where we intended to have lunch, I immediately launched into a discussion about the hut they were going to, how far we had gone, and where we were stopping for lunch. After a farewell, a little later she was able to look down over us from a swing bridge and gave a friendly wave before heading up the hill." Alan
- "We passed quite a few other people, singles and family groups, all clothed to the hilt. Most people I think were more interested in navigating the terrain to worry about 7 naked humans. And although a couple said, 'We must try that next time', didn't [immediately] take up the challenge of, "Why wait? Do it now!" Maybe they will. In the last couple of years, we have seen a lot of division and fear in the community and it is great to be able to get out again and have the freedom of choice in what we do. The tide is slowly turning and people are starting to question the status quo and, maybe, open their thoughts to accepting naturism as mainstream. Now that would be good for society!" *Charles*
- "What I can't resist reflecting on is the reaction of women. Firstly, that's because most are cheerful and friendly, sometimes singing out hello to us first, often waving an additional greeting when we're spotted somewhere else on the track as it doubles back on itself. Were I to try and speculate why this might be, particularly in the case of younger women on their own, my guess is that they might be relieved to encounter a group of males who are so non-threatening. This might sound completely counter-intuitive, but if you stop for a moment to think about it, what kind of insecure macho bloke is going to strip off with a bunch of other guys and walk naked in the bush?" If any of our group were apprehensive at the start of the walk about hiking naked, those fears were laid to rest by the positive and encouraging attitudes shown by virtually all of the many clothed trampers we met along the way. Several beneficial observations and outcomes were demonstrated, both to members of our group and to members of the public that we encountered:

- 1. In appropriate circumstances, the average reasonable person has no problem with nudity, even in the presence of children. This is an important fact to remember when considering the application of the law in New Zealand. The threshold for prosecution under Section 4, Summary Offences Act 1981 (Offensive behaviour) is very high. To get a conviction, police would have to prove something more than that someone was offended by the sight of a naked person. They would have to prove a person disrupted public order so much that other members of the public were unable to go about their normal activities in that place. For behaviour to be "offensive behaviour", it must be calculated to wound the feelings, arouse anger or resentment or disgust or outrage in the mind of a reasonable person. Clearly, our hike demonstrated that the many reasonable people we encountered were anything but offended!
- 2. Kids have no problem with nudity. On the day before the hike, the kids of the family we encountered asked me questions such as how far is it to the top, or how muddy the track gets, or anything else about their trip. The only question relating to my nakedness was, "Isn't it cold without any clothes on?" I assured him that it was actually very comfortable. There was not even a hint of any discomfort. To him it was unremarkable.
- 3. Although only a drop in a very big ocean, this was one more event that helped to normalise nudity as an acceptable dress code in appropriate circumstances in the minds of the public. A few weeks earlier, we cycled the busy Hauraki Rail Trail from Paeroa to Waikino and back. The more we can get out there into the public domain without clothing, allowing people to get used to seeing others enjoying recreational activities such as these without clothes, the more acceptable it becomes. That's how trends develop.
- **4**. Activities such as this give Naturists more confidence in how reasonable people react towards nudity. More often than not, the fear of offending, in the mind of the Naturist, is far greater than warranted.
- 5. In 2013 Andrew Pointon of Tauranga was convicted of mowing his lawns and gardening while naked. The District Court Judge's reason for the guilty verdict was ridiculous, ruling that "Pointon knew what he did would cause offence to some of his neighbours, and did so in any event." But the defence failed on a technicality. Andrew should never have lost that case and it should never have gone to appeal. Now, nine years later, more precedents have been set in the courts. Today, such a complaint is highly unlikely to be taken very far by police, let alone make it through the front doors of a courthouse. By taking part in and documenting activities in public spaces, noting particularly the accepting attitude of the public, we are slowly amassing a wealth of evidence to counter any "I'm so offended!" complaint to the police.

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Nude Tuesday

Jackie van Beek and Damon Herriman star in new comedy from GoodThing Productions and FireFly Films

An absurdist comedy about a couple that spends a week at a new-age retreat in a bid to save their marriage, Nude Tuesday stars Jackie van Beek (The Breaker Upperers), Damon Herriman (Stan* Original Series The Tourist) and Jemaine Clement (Flight of the Conchords).

The film is directed by Armagan Ballantyne (The Strength of Water) from a screenplay by Jackie van Beek and based on a story by van Beek and Ballantyne. Produced by Emma Slade for FireFly Films (The Justice of Bunny King) and Virginia Whitwell and Nick Batzias. Madman is handling theatrical distribution in Australia and New Zealand.

When middle-aged suburban couple Laura (Jackie van Beek) and Bruno (Damon Herriman) are gifted a remote couples' retreat for their anniversary, they decide to give their failing marriage one last shot before calling it quits.

Pubic hair, nudism & the censor

Annebella Pollen, Reader in History of Art & Design, University of Brighton; makes some pertinent observations in the UK precedents in their photographic battles to depict the naked body.

I look at nude bodies all the time in my work. Art history is full of them – painted, sculpted and photographed – and they fill the walls of galleries and museums. I stand before them, projected on screens, as I lecture on the subject. Earlier in my career, I posed on the other side of the artist's easel, as a life model, where I looked at artists looking at me. This dual perspective has given me a privileged position, as both subject and surveyor of the nude.

Contemporary artists might critique the nude's traditions and ideals, but the naked body is still the ground on which debates play out. But one key aspect prevails in art galleries: nudes are most likely to be of women and created by men.

Feminist activists the Guerilla Girls, who style themselves as the conscience of the art world, have kept a running count of exhibited works by female artists (around 4%) compared to the number of nudes that are female (around 76%) in New York's Metropolitan Museum of Modern Art for more than 30 years. The naked body and its visual depiction has always attracted attention and generated heated debate.

Today, the display of nudity remains contentious, particularly in the context of social media. This is both in relation to photographs of "real nude adults", as Facebook describes them, and in relation to "artistic or creative" depictions of nudity, which are wholly banned by Instagram and its parent company. While Facebook officially states that it permits nudity in images of paintings and sculptures, there have been famous recent cases where photographs of celebrated artworks, including the 25,000-year-old figurine, the Venus of Willendorf, and 17th century paintings by Peter Paul Rubens have been taken down and described as "pornographic". To circumnavigate the censor, some museums have even recently opened accounts on OnlyFans, a controversial social media platform most often associated with the promotion and sale of material intended to sexually arouse, rather than the viewing of fine art

In my new book, Nudism in a Cold Climate, I've been examining earlier attitudes to nude bodies, and their photographic depiction, especially in relation to legal restrictions around the representation of naturists, and the depiction of nudes in photographs produced as art in mid 20th-century Britain. The historic parallels are striking.

Facebook, for example, currently does not permit the depiction of "visible genitalia", with limited exceptions around birth and health contexts, and even in these cases, it requires photoshopping for nude close-ups.

What this meant, was that the emerging nudist movement could only depict nude bodies in their publications by photographing members and models in strategic poses that concealed sex organs and pubic hair. Where this was not possible, they needed to blur genitals out, visually smooth them over, or even paint on underpants.

For a movement founded on liberation from convention and bodily visibility, this was a core



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contradiction, and the resulting photographs created a sense of forbidden fruit. This was exactly the message that nudists wished to avoid.

Nude for health

Early nudists insisted that going nude, outdoors, in groups, was good for physical and mental health. They also wanted a clear moral distinction to be made between nude bodies and sexual desire. They argued, in the 1930s, in the pages of their magazine, Sun Bathing Review, that "honest photography

would induce mental honesty, and help sweep away the rude idea of sex-secrecy".

Retouched photographs, on the other hand. were

"more likely to create squeamishness, hypocrisy, and misunderstanding, and thus retard the progress we are trying to make towards freedom and sanity".

The 1857 Obscene Publications Act had been established to prosecute pornographic works - but as both obscenity and pornography depended on the eye of the beholder, for over a century fresh debate was required in each case.

Lord Chief Justice Cockburn's 1868 definition of obscenity endured for much of the 20th century: that which could "deprave and corrupt those whose minds are open to such immoral influences and into whose hands a publication of this

Given its vague premise, obscenity prosecution rested on a range of factors including "circumstances of publication". Alec Craig, an ardent nudist and vociferous anti-censorship campaigner, advised in the 1930s that "snaps taken in a nudist camp cannot be considered 'obscene'".

But he warned: "What may be perfectly innocuous in one set of circumstances may be 'obscene' in another. To take an extreme example," he noted, "nude photographs, quite unobjectionable in normal circumstances, might be held to be 'obscene' if circulated in a convent school." Likewise, outside of the careful framing of the nudist magazine, a nude photograph carried a range of meanings that could prove hard to pin down in a court of law.

Nudist magazines published photographs to show the movement's ideals but many members did not wish to be depicted for reasons of respectability.

The emerging imagery of nudism was a mixture of candid photographs of camp life, painterly depictions of young slim bodies in pastoral settings, and action photographs showing athletic bodies exercising. As men's bodies needed to be doc-

tored with a heavier hand to pass the censor, and as nudism was dominated at the outset by men (as members, photographers, writers, editors and readers), nude women were its central photographic focus.



By the 1930s, female photographic nudes could be found on the walls of photography exhibitions as well as in the pages of art, anatomy and anthropology books, men's magazines, daily newspapers, photojournalist weeklies and naturist monthlies. In some cases, with adjusted context, the same images could appear in all these locations, challenging nudism's claims that its publications and its photographs were morally and aesthetically distinct.

The nude photograph on trial

This was the case with photographs by Horace Narbeth, professionally known as "Roye", whose prolific and commercially adaptable imagery was repurposed for a wide range of audiences and arguments. Roye's photographs, always of young women, often posed in outdoor settings, simultaneously articulated abstract notions of "beauty" and "womanhood" in art books, and ideas about "freedom" and Phyllis in Censorland "nature" in nudist publications.



Roye had long been frustrated with British obscenity regulations and made play with what he perceived to be their hypocrisies in his 1942 publication, Phyllis in Censorland. The cover design showed burlesque dancer Phyllis Dixey, the socalled British queen of striptease. Its contents comprised nude and near-nude photographs, accompanied by mocking verses. Each poem pilloried those who sought to protect public morals while enjoying privileged pleasures of surveillance.

The 1951 Conservative government oversaw escalating destruction orders and extended punishments in a period when cheap magazines were booming. In 1954, around 167,000 books and magazines were seized, and imprisonments ranged from three to 18 months. In their enthusiasm to uphold public morals, magistrates ordered the destruction of eminent artistic and literary works including Boccaccio's 14th century the Decameron.

In 1958, Roye went one step further and launched a private subscription series of un-retouched nudes under the title Unique Editions. While the content included naturist-style nudes in rural environments, which could offer some legal protection, the photographs attracted police attention. A thousand copies were seized from Roye's studio. He was called to court. Before the jury, Roye positioned himself in the aesthetic avant-garde. Retouching, he argued, was a sacrifice of "artistic integrity". His defence lawyer argued that:

Standards had changed since 1868, when pictures of Venus, in the Dulwich Gallery, had shocked Londoners; and it would be unrealistic to say that, in 1958, a photograph of a woman without clothing was an obscene thing.

Roye compiled letters of support arguing for the public benefit of viewing nude photographs. His supporters shared arguments with nudists who believed that sex crimes would be eliminated and Victorian prudishness overturned.

In Roye's case, however, the public need for openness and bodily display seemed only to apply to the

viewing of young female models' flesh. Nonetheless, he was acquitted.

Roye's prosecution coincided with proposals to revise the Obscene Publications Act. Following public derision when acclaimed cultural works had been seized, 1959 amendments exempted from prosecution material with literary or artistic merit.



Contemplation

The nude was singled out for mention in parliamentary discussions about the problem of definition. The home secretary, Rab Butler, noted that nudes could be used for art historical lectures "to provide inspiration for the painter or photographer or, on the other hand, be degraded for the purposes of the pornographer's wares". Although MPs argued that it was "easy to tell the difference between the Song of Solomon and a collection of salacious photographs", the problem was the evaluation of material in between.

Freedom of vision

Ethelred Jean Straker was a Bohemian Soho photographer who ran a busy studio throughout the 1950s and 1960s providing classes for amateurs - mostly male - in the production of "artistic figure studies", or nude photographs of models – always women. Straker tested the revised obscenity laws, but unlike Roye, he received guilty verdicts.

Straker's book secured positive reviews from



artistic luminaries but Jean Straker, Visual Arts Club, c.1960

showed only a small, sanitised selection of his nude output, which extended to some 10,000 examples and included close-ups of women's breasts, buttocks and genitalia.

The full range of Straker's work could be viewed and ordered for purchase via his Femina gallery, above his Soho studio. In his advertisements for his services, Straker described the female nude rapturously as "a microcosm of the forces which play upon the mind and emotions of the creative person". He claimed his studies offered "not only a sense of affective perception but also a source of unimpaired anatomical evidence".

Straker's nudes repeatedly drew the attention of the police. In 1962, in the High Court, Straker was a thorn in the side of the prosecution. Highly informed about the 1959 Obscene Publications Act, Straker reminded the court of their obligation to "uphold and license the freedoms of expression of the artist". Despite pleas for the value of his work to art and science, Straker lost the case and was fined £150 (about £5,000 today).

Undeterred, he continued to sell "unretouched" nudes by mail order until he was prosecuted again in 1965. Straker became a vocal anti-censorship campaigner, calling for "freedom of vision" alongside freedom of speech.

In 1967, Oxford University's student magazine, Oxymoron, published 'Sun Sun Worship Worship', which had been among material previously seized in a police raid but a decade later it was published with university authorisation and escaped prosecution, illustrating the changing times.

By the end of the 1960s, the battle to show more flesh was complete. Un-retouched photographic nudes were openly published in pornographic magazines, naturist periodicals and art books alike.

New nude censorship debates

Whether this led to greater bodily liberation, especially for the young women who are most likely to be depicted, was a question raised by feminists at the time, and it remains open for debate. Campaigns for visibility continue to arise in the present day with new agendas in nude representation.

Free the Nipple, for example, stakes similar claims in its calls for freedom from censorship on social media. Like earlier protests against the photographic retouching of genitals, its campaigners see the characterisation of

women's bodies as sexual and offensive – when male toplessness is considered neutral – as illogical.

Why has the showing of nudity remained so fraught? The issue remains one of context and intention. Naturists have argued hard that social nudity can be non-sexual, and naturism has a fiercely protected legal status.

Photographs of nude bodies, however, naturist or otherwise, can serve a range of purposes and, like all photographs, they are open to a wide range of readings and meanings, reinterpretations and reuse. Photographers and publishers may argue for the value of full-frontal nudes to communicate health, artistry and freedom, but even photographs produced for non-sexual communication can serve sexual ends.

On social media, where photographic quantities are vast and mostly surveyed by machine, it is easier for Facebook to apply blanket bans than engage with individual nude images' complexities. While it states that its policies have become more nuanced over time, they are still unable to cope with the sometimes subtle borderlines between categories. Facebook

recognises that nudes can be used "as a form of protest, to raise awareness about a cause or for educational or medical reasons", and says they make allowances "where such intent is clear".

However, many forms of bodily display, including in artistic practice, do not fit Facebook's frames, and intention is notoriously hard to gauge in a photograph. These were the technical and semantic distinctions on which nude photographers' court cases were won and lost historically, and issues of intent and use remain today.

At the end of the second world war, nudist Michael Rutherford addressed "historians of the future" in his field guide, entitled British Naturism. He predicted that scholars would consider the practice "among the significant and important happenings of this, the 20th century". He wrote: "If our grandchildren can say of us, as they grow up to a sane acceptance of their own bodies: "What was all that fuss about...?" we shall have done our part." But a century after the founding of nudism as a social movement, and 50 years since non-manipulated nude photographs could be printed without fear of prosecution, the current censorship of nudes on social media seems regressive.

We are Rutherford's grandchildren, but we certainly do not have the "sane" attitudes to nudity that he predicted.

Dear Mr Lyon,

Thank you for your RNZ National interview on Wednesday 27th April, regarding Apple's launch of the 'new child safety feature' in New Zealand.

On the face of it the Apple initiative looks to be sensible but your summary of it as it would be applied in NZ was quite tentatively worded – presumably to avoid the reality that simple nudity *per se*, is not actually illegal here including for children.

However, a casual glance at the various official NZ websites that now proliferate around the 'safety of children' as related to 'porn' gives, overall, a seriously unbalanced sense that the recognition of our own form (especially for children) is simply part of the 'big danger' out there. I'm sure that you are aware of the place of Naturism in our society, because to me that was the 'issue of potential contention' that you were careful to tip-toe around during your interview.

The overwhelming sense from all these 'help' sites is that generally the term 'nude' is a simple shorthand for the word 'porn'. Apart from actually being 'false news' - even unconsciously; that message is simply dangerous! Humans are the only animal that (in way too many cases) attempts to specifically divert its offspring from direct, physical knowledge of its own form. In the animal kingdom any animal brought up not knowing its adult form has unhelpful neurological consequences.

Kids who grow up in families where nudity is the normal practice are actually 'porn-proofed'. They have no interest in seeking pornography because they already know what our bodies look like.

May I suggest that for the future, you preface any similar interviews with an explanation such as, "First, personal nude images, such as those commonly taken in the backyards of open or naturist families, are not illegal - they are legal for children to see, *because* they are <u>not</u> 'pornographic'. Obviously, porn may involve nudity but the key difference is that: pornography either clearly implies, or actually has, some sort of sexual context."

It is illegal to 'exploit the nudity of children'. The protection of children from images carrying a specifically 'sexual context' is what the law legitimately attempts to do. The NZ Naturist Federation strongly supports the New Zealand law in both those regards.

The Federation is very happy to assist any official website with its wording where it could be subject to problematic comprehension.

Taranaki photographer honoured in international film festival

A documentary about a groundbreaking Taranaki photographer is one of the first six films announced from the 2021 Whānau Mārama: New Zealand International Film Festival (NZIFF) programme.

Fiona Clark: Unafraid, directed by Lula Cucchiara, follows the story of one of Aotearoa's most notable photographers.

NZIFF says Fiona shocked 1970s New Zealand with her documentary images of Auckland's burgeoning queer scene.

"The pictures they tried to ban were just the beginning for one of Aotearoa's photography greats. The 82-minute documentary recounts how Fiona overcame censorship, homophobia, sexism and debilitating physical injuries to become one of the most respected social documentarians."

The film invites audiences inside the decommissioned Taranaki dairy factory that Fiona calls her home and office, an abandoned milking shed converted into a darkroom and powered by its own natural gas well, repaired by the photographer herself.

"Through a series of candid interviews, the documentary paints a picture of the artist as an eclectic, staunchly independent force of nature."

NZIFF said Fiona is best known for documenting Auckland's queer scene.

"The film also affords rich reflection on her diverse portfolio, including collaborating with tangata whenua to fight environmental degradation and documenting a burgeoning Kiwi body-building community."

Fiona has been instrumental in ensuring the history of marginalised communities in Aotearoa is documented and preserved, even when society at large preferred them forgotten.

"Fiona Clark: Unafraid returns the favour, ensuring the photographer's legacy lives to capture another day." Adrian Hatwell
