

**The "Tent" Years** - While we all know KNP as an award-winning park now, the "Naked Truth" of its start is a classic bit of Kiwi grit. Kevin and Joan Sampson bought the bare scrubland back in '94 and literally lived in a tent for seven weeks while their house was being built.

**By early 1996**, they'd transformed that "messy" block into a fully functional park with a pool, spa, and 20 powered sites. Guests at the party spent the evening poring over an old photo album, marveling at just how much "hard graft" went into clearing that land.

**A fabulous spread** - Around 6:30 pm, the call went out for the potluck. Overseen by Perry and a band of willing helpers, the spread was top-shelf: salads, rice dishes, meats, and enough "community spirit" to feed an army. It was the perfect backdrop for a night of storytelling.

**Passing the Torch** - Current owner Brien Lampen-Smith officially introduced the guests of honour, and Kevin took us back to the early days. He spoke about the decade of improvements leading up to their 2016 departure, and while he acknowledged a few "tough years" under previous management, he was stoked to see the park looking so sharp under Brien's new leadership.

**Dancing into the New Dawn** - As the speeches wrapped up, the music kicked in. Some hit the dance floor, others retreated to the spa pools, and the conversation kept flowing well into the night. It was more than a birthday party; it was a reminder that KNP isn't just a business—it's a community built on 30 years of shared freedom.

Cheers to Kevin and Joan for the vision, and to Brien for keeping the "Pulse" beating strong.

During May-July 2025 (spring and summer in the northern hemisphere), my partner Nicola and I spent 3 months cycling through the Netherlands, Germany Poland and the south of England. Where possible we stayed at naturist campsites or private clubs. I say 'where possible' because bike travel is less flexible in terms of deviations from the route – a 100km detour to a campsite that would take an hour or two by car is a day or two's ride by bike. Despite this we managed to include 10 different locations in the Netherlands, Germany and England. Poland, although it has a huge number of features to recommend it – beautiful old towns and countryside, great wildlife, lovely people and food (unexpectedly good for us as vegetarians) - is not really a naturist destination. The Dutch Naturist Federation's Bloot Kompass app for finding naturist locations identifies only 3 accommodation providers in the country, none of which was really suitable for our route.

During a bike trip through France, Spain and Portugal in 2024, we found we were often the only non-Dutch guests at most naturist campsites, so we were expecting the Netherlands to be good, and it was. First stop was Camping Abtswoudse Hoeve, close enough to Delft for us to bike in to explore this beautiful old town. The campsite is set around a lake and despite being early May (with a light frost in the morning), it was just about warm enough for a swim. Like all the sites we stayed at, everyone was very friendly.

We spent 2 nights at the next site, Camping de Maat, using it as a base to visit Utrecht, another town of elegant houses fronting onto canals. The club is part of the Zon en Leven naturist association, with 9 clubs around the country, each run by members. De Maat was perhaps our favourite campsite of the trip, with tent pitches among apple trees, a very plush club house, and a lovely natural swimming pool, fringed with water plants. There is also a sauna but we unfortunately missed the weekly sauna night.

On the way to Camping de Maat, we passed a rest stop selling coffee and cake, part of a chain of such places run by local people from their homes. The outstanding feature of this one was a beautiful model railway that circled around the walls of the guest toilet, with trains passing through tunnels and changing levels, all controlled from buttons next to the toilet!

Camping Lichtbond Gelre (Lichtbond is another naturist association) is in Veluwezoom National Park, surrounded by forest and providing access to kilometres of hiking, cycling and mountain biking tracks. It too has a stunning club house with cooking facilities, a sauna (we missed sauna night, again) but no pool. The site is surrounded by a fence, providing privacy and security and perhaps some reassurance given that there are wolves in the surrounding national park (the chances of seeing one are probably very slim). As with the other clubs, cabins and camping pods can also be hired.

Just over the border (not that one exists anymore), the Sonnenhof Marbeck club is also inside a nature reserve, the Hohe Mark Nature Park, and is run by members. The member who was on caretaker duty let us in at the gate but before leading us into the grounds asked “You do know this is a naturist club?” to which Nicola replied “That’s why we’re here!” – perhaps past arrivals have had an unexpected surprise. The club house here is the former house of a gentleman farmer, who now rents the house and grounds to the club. There are rooms to hire, a kitchen and large sitting areas inside and out. A stream runs through the grounds and there is a large swimming pool, a sauna and a very smart ablutions block that was renovated a couple of years ago. Predictably, we had missed sauna night, and the pool was not yet open for the season, but we still had a lovely stay.

Our next stop, FSG Senneriffa, near Bielefeld, also has a big swimming pool and a sauna both of which were open – yay! We spent a sunny afternoon swimming and sunbathing on the lawns around our tent followed by an evening sauna. There is a big communal kitchen and the amount of equipment, crockery, etc. suggests that the club must hold enormous social events.

The other two naturist campsites we stayed at in Germany were both commercial. We camped at Naturcamping-Tonsee FKK on our way to Poland and on the way back. The first time, in May, was very quiet and most of the other visitors were members with permanent caravans or cabins (some with very established gardens). We had a quick dip in the lake on which the camp is located, which was warmer than we had expected. Odd things about this campsite were that you had to provide your own toilet paper, and all hot water (showers, but also washing-up sinks, etc.) had to be paid for by coin meter. When we returned in July, the campsite was heaving with people and on a sunny weekend the small sandy beach and field behind it were packed.



A public path leads through the camp from the road so many of the people were not staying at the camp. The tent area was some distance from the amenities block and beach and it was also open to the public path, which was a bit of a security concern, though we had no problems. We spent our first day swimming in the lake, sunbathing and wandering through the adjacent clothes-free woodland. After that the weather became cooler and wetter and we used the camp as a base to visit Berlin by train from the nearby station. The camp has a restaurant but both times were stayed only a small bistro kiosk was serving food and drinks, with seating out on the big deck area. The camp also has rooms to hire above the amenities area.

The naturist campsite at Halbendorf is part of a larger textile campsite but separate from it and on the opposite side of an arm of the Hablendorfer See. There is a sandy beach beside the beautiful lake, and an area of pine woods which can be explored naked. The camp is separated from the beach area by a public walking and biking path. The showers and toilets are very good and there is a laundry, but facilities for tent campers are limited – not ideal when it rained. Despite the variable weather, it made a good base to visit the nearby Bad Muschau palace and its extensive gardens.



In the UK we cycled around London from Cambridge to near Basingstoke, where we had arranged to house sit, staying at 3 clubs along the way. The first, Sunfolk, near St Albans, is run by British Naturism, who took over a failing club and extensively renovated the facilities. In addition to gravelled parking areas for camper vans and lawns with shade trees for camping, there is a beautiful new clubhouse with a big dining area/lounge, a fully equipped kitchen and TV room. The club also has a spa, sauna and covered swimming pool (this is the UK after all). We were shown around by a very friendly club member on caretaker duty and spent a lovely 2 days there, using it as a base to visit the 1000-year old abbey at St Albans. It also has an easy rail connection to central London.



The other two clubs, Diogenes in the Chiltern Hills and Heritage near Reading, both had club houses with accommodation, fully equipped kitchens and big outdoor pools. Even though it was mid-week, Diogenes was busy with visiting members and there was a well-attended sauna session in the late afternoon. The clubs are in the countryside, and their grounds are wooded. Both are highly recommended.

From our limited experience on this trip, we found clubs to be much better options for staying than commercial sites, both in terms of facilities and friendliness. However, on the trip to France and Spain last year, we enjoyed private clubs and commercial sites equally, so perhaps the difference this time simply reflects the small number of commercial sites visited. An interesting (and disappointing) contrast between the Dutch and English clubs that we visited and those in Germany is that a lot of members at German clubs and campsites smoked around the communal outdoor areas. Although we belong to NZNF through Free Beaches, we also joined the Netherlands Naturist Federation for the year, just in case some of the clubs were fussy. Membership was not expensive but in fact I don't think that we were asked to prove membership at any of the places we visited.

The recent EveryBody Exhibition in Christchurch brought together a bold, expressive look at the human form, one that felt right at home in a naturist context. The exhibition also marked the launch of Curators Chamber, Jodie's new business. The idea is pretty simple, "it's about stripping away the jargon and formality," to make it easier for people to connect with art they truly love, while supporting artists to sustain and grow their practice". - says Jodie.



Grounded by Jodie's naturist worldview, Curators Chamber embraces artists who approach the human form openly and without apology, continuing to broaden the conversation around how we see and represent the human form.

One of the benefits of belonging to the NZNF and being a member of a club is meeting and making new friends at national rallies and festivals. Our trip north gave me the opportunity to renew two such friendships, one going back nearly 50 years and the other around 14 years.



We flew from Wellington to Kerikeri, picked up a rental car and stayed our first night in a lovely quiet accommodation (Cosy Nights – Booking.com). The next day we drove south to stay with ex members of WNC Brent and Cathy, who gave up their corporate life in Wellington to fulfil a dream of being able to live naturist lifestyle on a 50 acre block near Tutukaka. They also fulfilled another dream of writing and publishing novels.

Turning off at Ngunguru, we travelled several kilometres inland along sealed road before reaching a long gravel driveway. Up and down several hills we finally arrived at their place, an absolutely magic spot and well worth the trip. You can check out this accommodation on AirBNB (called “Retreat 480”). The accommodation is a 2 story unit completely separate from the main dwelling. Kitchen and patio downstairs and bed, lounge and toilet upstairs. The shower is situated outside in the bush. What a fantastic experience. Brent and Cathy’s own house perched on the top of a hill, has magnificent views back towards Whangarei and north over the bush to the Bay of Islands..

The first night was such a thrill to actually hear wild kiwi calling. Moreporks also and we couldn’t wait to explore the trails Brent has been developing through the native bush around the property. A naturists paradise.



We were there the night of a moon eclipse and able to watch the full moon rise while sitting in the spa pool. It was just perfect to view this and to enjoy the emerging lights of the night sky



Brent was kind enough to take us out on his beautiful boat, which sleeps 4. Once outside Tutukaka harbour it was time to don the club uniform while Brent motored to Whale Bay, through massive flocks of shearwater birds which kept up with the 40 ks an hour we were travelling. The Poor Knights islands viewed in the distance is one of the great dive spots in the world. While anchored at Whale Bay we enjoyed our packed lunch and a bottle of chilled rose. With no one on shore, after lunch there was no problem taking his tender ashore and walking along the beach completely nude. Lovely golden sand and pohutakawa trees down to the waters edge. Absolute magic.

Kindness and chivalry is helping get a lady octaganarian into the tender first for the return journey to the boat. Then, while she sitting at the front, hilarity is watching the next passenger get in and also sit on the edge. Unfortunately, as Brent tried to balance it and get in himself, a rogue wave suddenly sent the passenger off the edge and rather gracefully backwards over into the water, hat and all much to the amusement of the others. Just as well the water was warm. So warm in fact that on returning to the boat there was time for another nude swim!

After leaving our wonderful Ngunguru experience we first travelled to Whangarei to visit the studio of another WNC member and his glass blowing workshop. Keith Grinter's glass is beautiful and well known throughout NZ.



While there we also visited the nearby Hundertwasser Cultural Centre, an unmissable experience if you are in Whangarei. Hundertwasser was a world famous Austrian architect perhaps best known in New Zealand for designing a toilet block at Kawakawa. His life history and art is beautifully presented and explained in the Centre.

After leaving Whangarei we drove north to another naturist friend's place in the Far North (not to be confused with Northland as the top of New Zealand it is known as the Far North!!) Rosco and his late wife Raewyn have been farming Ostriches and Emus for many years, creating an emu oil business which they sold widely. Following Raewyn's passing, Rosco is down the just 4 emus and several chickens and ducks. He also has access to a river to go fishing; he grows bananas, passionfruit, feijoas and much more. Several of his bromeliads have even made the journey south to WNC. were there we had to have a go at these. Such fun!



Rosco has also developed a 9-hole golf course and pétanque piste to entertain visitors so while we were there we had to have a go at these. Such fun!

Roscoe kindly took us to see the local sights including a trip to the Kaitaia market on Sunday. This was a highlight with so many locally produced products and crafts for sale alongside the many food trucks. Another outstanding visit was to the Ka Uri café and museum where we found beautiful swamp kauri pieces made into furniture and trays, as well as the largest kauri trunk ever salvaged. The interior of this had been carved out to create a circular interior staircase inside.

We also visited Ahipara at the south end of 90 mile beach where the annual fishing competition was being held.

Our trip was a truly lovely catchup with naturist friends and creating more very happy memories.
